RE: R-3-R

The following observation has been made in various areas in the world, at Flag also, in the field of Dianetic Auditing, and that is:

A Pc or Pre-OT, sometimes, when given command (7) of R3R which is, "Move through the incident to a point (duration) later," does actually move through and AT THE SAME TIME TELLS YOU WHAT IS HAPPENING in the incident. Well, the pc was asked then step (9) which is, "What happened?" and the answer was "I just told you" PLUS slight bad indicators which later on were worked out to be a slight protest from the pc on being asked to tell the auditor what happened in the incident he was running, as the pc had actually told the auditor what happened while he was going through the incident.

Well, when one understands the mechanics of engram running and how it affects the reactive mind, one can understand why the pc had a slight protest on the above instance. In auditing, one does not have to be a "rote" auditor, sitting there, not really understanding what the pc is doing, otherwise ARC Breaks occur.

So, this is what was done at Flag and, of course, the results were standard.

When the pc told the auditor what happened in the incident he was being run on, while he was going through, the auditor merely acknowledged the pc and proceeded with A, B, C, D.

The same applies to step (C) and D.

In other words, if the pc tells you what happens in the incident (step 9 of R3R), while he is going through the incident (step 7 of R3R), acknowledge him when he finishes and DON'T ASK him again for Step (9), but go ahead with your A, B, C, D.

This is to be very well noted by auditors as it is quite important in the field of the reactive mind. In a case like the one mentioned in this HCO B, the reason it might be upsetting not to do as stressed, is that you are asking the pc to tell you what happened in the incident without making him go through it twice, when he can confront it much better.

This procedure, only when it occurred in auditing, was used and the wins were even bigger and faster.

It can be of some help.
